Ignite the Power and Potential of Each Student March 2, 2020

Dear Waterbury School Community,

During February, three grade levels have scheduled in-school field trips. These presentations from the Morton Arboretum and Rockford's Discovery Center Museum provided our students with new opportunities for learning through experience and have reinforced concepts that have already been learned in their classroom.

Grade 1 - Morton Arboretum – When It Snows

How do animals survive the long, snowy winter? Where do they go and what do they eat when it starts to snow? Our first graders discovered the answers to these questions by observing pelts, shells, and skulls in their classroom on Thursday, February 6. Educators from Morton Arboretum taught them about animal adaptations and seasonal changes with a book, games, songs, and other activities.







Grade 3 - Discovery Center Museum – Forces in Motion

Our students saw amazing feats come together to weave the story of Newton's Laws of Motion in this fascinating physics program presented by an instructor from Rockford's Discovery Center Museum that focused on third grade Next Generation Science Standards. In physics, force is a push or pull on an object. A force can cause an object to accelerate, slow down, remain in place, or change shape. The students' favorite part of this program was when the instructor demonstrated the physics and forces behind the game Angry Birds.



Grade 4 - Morton Arboretum – Hands-on Habitats

Our students have learned that a habitat is a home for plants and animals. Educators from Morton Arboretum helped them to discover what plants and animals make a home for themselves in Illinois' woodlands, wetlands, and prairies. The students also learned about the adaptations that animals have developed to live in certain ecosystems. They explored skulls and pelts and used microscopes to get a new view of our local herbivores, omnivores, and carnivores.
